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### MAELEZO YA KOZI (COURSE DESCRIPTION)

**KARIBUNI!** This course is designed to enable students to acquire intermediate conversational, reading, and writing skills sufficient to engage in meaningful Swahili speech activities. The primary goal of this course is therefore to build and enhance what was covered in the beginning Kiswahili and further provide students with the spoken knowledge of the language. The course will focus on comprehension and interpretation of Swahili texts and develop advanced grammatical and expository writing skills. Conversational and reading texts will include current topical issues reported in Swahili newspapers and webbased resources, and selected readings from modern Swahili authors, with focus on the novel, illustrative of East African cultural aspects. By the end of the course, learners will advance their Kiswahili proficiency to intermediate mid and intermediate high levels.

## MALENGO YA KOZI (OBJECTIVES)

### Communication

Learners will be able to:

- 1. Exchange personal information in relation to the various topics such as health, family travel and entertainment.
- 2. Respond to questions about their daily routines during the homestay and compare that schedule with what they normally do at home and what they are doing in the target country.
- 3. Can ask questions about business practices and major products of East African countries.
- 4. Respond to questions about different places they will visit and the means of transportation
- 5. Talk about the tourism aspects of the trip places they visited and things they did during the visits.
- 6. Respond to questions about important products from their home countries and the different ways
- 7. Bargain for goods at the market
- 8. Talk about a few customs and traditions that they learned when interacting with native speakers of the language they are learning.
- 9. Can describe their summer plans for traveling and living with a family in East Africa
- 10. Can give a presentation about some of the major various topics i.e. health, food and nutrition among others that are covered in the course
- 11. Can write a blog about a trip they took to East Africa
- 12. Can write about something they learned from their host family experience.
- 13. Can understand descriptions of the places they visited.
- 14. Can understand directions to find their way around town.
- 15. Can understand questions about a recent or forth coming trip.
- 16. Can understand personal questions asked on an application to live with a host family.
- 17. Can understand information on travel brochures and on travel-related websites
- 18. Can understand blog posts about familiar topics.
- 19. Can understand the questions they are asked and be able to answer the questions.

#### **Culture**

Learners will be able to:

1. Understand why the notion of "individualism" is a foreign concept to East Africans.

- 2. Understand the importance of knowing how to use honorific terms and pronouns for bosses and older people in the society.
- 3. Bargain for cheaper prices at the market.
- 4. Why the East African people regard those who do not greet as extremely rude or holding grudges.
- 5. Understand what the kinship terms in Swahili language reveal about the East African culture.
- 6. Understand the role of extended family structure in the lives of East African Swahili speaking children.
- 7. Understand that East Africans show a high level of tolerance for other religious beliefs.
- 8. Understand the critical role that respect to elders and superiors at work play in the society.
- 9. Understand the important role that age plays in Swahili culture.
- 10. Understand that hierarchy is important in Swahili, so relationships should be respected even in seating arrangements.
- 11. Understand the etiquette at social engagements, such as accepting someone's hospitality graciously after making a token effort to pay or waiting to talk about business at a business dinner only after the host does

# **Connections**

Learners will be able to:

- 1. Name the kinship terms in Swahili and explain the role that those terms play in understanding relationships among the East Africans.
- 2. Explain the role of "immediate and extended" family members among the Swahili speakers and compare these roles with other cultures of the world.
- 3. Explain the notion of "punctuality" among the East Africans and discuss the perspective that governs this notion and how lack of understanding of this notion can affect all relationships.
- 4. Read in Swahili newspapers how East African people advertise their products.

# **Comparisons**

Learners will be able to:

- 1. Compare the kinship terms in Swahili language and those in their language and understand why Swahili does not have some kinship terms that other languages, such as English, have.
- 2. Compare the notion of "respect" in the East African society with other cultures.
- 3. Compare the use of first names in Swahili culture and other cultures.
- 4. Compare questions in Swahili that one cannot ask but can ask in other cultures.
- 5. Compare the gestures that young people use to greet older people in Swahili and understand the perspective of that practice.
- 6. Compare Swahili family structure with other family structures in the world.
- 7. Compare popular products to those in their home countries.
- 8. Compare the communication style of high-context cultures, such as the Swahili, with that of low-context cultures, such as the US.
- 9. Compare appropriate and inappropriate conversation topics when meeting someone for the first time in East Africa with acceptable topics in other cultures.

#### **Communities**

Learners will be able to:

- 1. Use their Swahili language to interact with native speakers of Yoruba in their school, at work, and in the community.
- 2. Present Swahili skits during class cultural activities for others in the community to enjoy.
- 3. Give a presentation on any topic of their choice to native speakers of Swahili in the community

# MAHUDHURIO (Class attendance, participation & Homework) 20%

Attendance to all classes is essential. Since the objectives of the course is to build on what was learned at elementary level of communication in Kiswahili, students must utilize their knowledge in preparing well before class. They must read the required chapters in the texts in order to engage in meaningful discussion. The Tuesday class will be devoted to comprehension and grammar with *Tusome Kiswahili* as the main text, while the Thursday class will focus on *Ndoto ya Amerika* which exposes students to seeing the language in text. Each student will be assigned portions of the text to translate and share in class and every student will be expected to participate in the class reading and discussion.

#### **READING & INTEPRETATION ON NDOTO YA AMERIKA (15 %)**

Students will be expected to work on potions of the text outside class and prepare to share with others in class. Issues arising from the text will be used to generate discussion topics, while difficult grammatical constructions will be highlighted and reviewed in class.

## EAST AFRICAN SWAHILI NEWS PRESENTATION 5%

Each student will be expected to familiarize themselves with news from the Swahili world. They will be given a chance to select a spoken news item and present it in class, explaining what it is about and generating discussion of the issue in the news.

## INSHA (Two Essays) 15%

Students will be expected to write two essays, one in the first half and the other in the second half of the semester on given topics. Other instructions on grammar usage will be given in class. These will be typed, double space, font 12, not more than three pages and will be emailed to the instructor on the due dates.

## JARIBIO LA NUSU-MUHULA (Mid Semester comprehension Exam) 20%

A mid-semester comprehension exam will be administered to evaluate the students' ability to comprehend Swahili content from varying language registers, mainly drawn from authentic newspaper articles and reports. This will be an in-class exam and part of the questions will address literary issues from *Ndoto ya Amerika*.

## MTIHANI WA MWISHO WA MUHULA (Final Exam) 25%

Students will be required to take a final exam on Grammar and issues encountered in the readings and class discussions of *Ndoto ya Amerika*. Students should be able to reference the text and other supplementary materials used in class.
